EDGEMONT TRADITIONS LIVE ON!

any of the unique characteristics and events that make Edgemont's schools so special are long-standing traditions that have been around for decades. At Greenville School, for example, one of the first things that people notice is the twin red doors. Newer than Seely Place, which opened in 1922 and functioned as the high school, Greenville School originally had eight rooms and 150 K-3 students for its inaugural academic year of 1950-51. The doors that have welcomed students, parents and faculty at the main entrance have been bright red as long as anyone can remember and at least since 1981, according to retiring Superintendent Nancy Taddiken. The doors were recently replaced, but of course no one even considered changing the color.

Another Edgemont tradition – for the last 57 years - is E-Day, which took place this year on May 11. E-Day gives kids from Kindergarten through 6th grade the chance to show their athletic ability in various competitions such as relay races, high jump, soccer kick, softball throw and basketball free throws. This annual event has been around so long that some students who participated in the first-ever E-Day are 70 years old today!

Alison Press (formerly Alison Mohr), who graduated from EHS in 1993 and now lives on Evandale Road with her husband and two children, recalls vividly "senior road painting" as an Edgemont student. "I remember that I couldn't wait to get out my spray paint because it signaled the unofficial start of my senior year," said Alison. She added, "when I see the new graffiti each year I am brought back 20 years, and am so happy that the kids are still doing it today."

The school newspaper, "The Edgemont Campus," which was founded in the 1950's, is not only an Edgemont tradition, but has also become somewhat of a tradition for the *Klein* family. EHS senior *Eilis Klein* is the current editor-in-chief, following in the footsteps of her father Dan, himself an Edgemont graduate. Eilis, who is destined for Connecticut College in the fall, quipped that she only got the top spot at the paper because she is a "legacy." Eilis explained that the current staff recently pulled several fascinating articles from the archives and re-printed them, including a particularly interesting article from the 1970's about the Ku Klux Klan.

For his part, Dan Klein believes that one of Edgemont's best traditions is the outdoor graduation ceremony. It "showcases the beautiful campus and is a great way to celebrate the graduating class," said Dan, who is looking forward to participating in this year's graduation yet again, but this time as a proud parent.

Although no one is sure when it all began, several current and former Edgemont students mentioned the game "Snap" as one of Edgemont's (continue on page 7)

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FOUNDATION HELPS BRIDGE SCHOOL BUDGET CHALLENGES by Michaeline Curtis

ublic school districts have never depended more on the generosity of private individuals or had a greater need for outside sources of funding. Shrinking state aid, increasing healthcare and pension costs, and unfunded state mandates are coming together in a perfect storm which stymies the district's ability to maintain current levels of educational programming. Like every district in the country, Edgemont struggles to balance the deployment of diminishing resources with the need for educational innovation.

Unlike every district, Edgemont has been able to turn to its parents and alumni organizations for relief. For years, programs like 6th grade camp or Senior Forum or the Circus have represented the heart and soul of an Edgemont education; they are the lovely, sweet moments our children remember. Because they were considered "non-essential," they found themselves on the chopping block when the District faced hard financial times. If it hadn't been for the generous support of the PTA/PTSA and Edgemont School Foundation, these would have been eliminated.

In previous years, the School Foundation has funded many upgrades to our physical plant as well as our technological systems. This year, the Foundation has provided funds for purchasing iPads which students and teachers are enthusiastically incorporating into the curriculum.

Edgemont teachers remain among the most innovative and committed educators in NY state. Our district needs to give them the tools and resources, technologically and otherwise, in order for them to remain educational leaders. If Edgemont is to continue in its position as one of the top public school districts in the state, it needs the creativity and generosity of its community and alumni supporters to help mitigate the effects of its diminishing resources.

IPAD GRANT KEEPS EDGEMONT ON TECHNOLOGY'S CUTTING EDGE

his year, Edgemont School Foundation awarded a grant of \$89,000 to fund a district-wide iPad initiative, aiming to integrate mobile computing devices into all three of the Edgemont schools. The grant provided a total of 105 iPads to the district, offering students and teachers the benefit of portable tablet computing and the multitude of available applications designed to support learning.



Foundation Co-Chair *Steven Heineman* said, "the use of iPads in all three Edgemont schools will keep Edgemont on the cutting edge of both technology and education. iPads have many advantages over traditional PCs, and with the large number of apps that have been designed specifically for educational purposes, iPads will provide a new and exciting dimension to the classroom. We are pleased to have been able to provide the necessary funding to make this initiative a reality."



In total, the district deployed four iPad carts, one in each elementary

school and two at Edgemont Jr/Sr High School. Each cart contains 25 iPads. Each school was also given 5 extra iPads to be used either as loaners or as replacements should the units in the cart need repair or maintenance. The grant also includes the infrastructure to manage and support all 105 iPads in the district: a Macbook for local management and a virtual server. Four Apple TV units enable iPad users to share their screen through ceiling mounted projectors in the classrooms around the building. The elementary carts are housed in each of the school's library. The two carts at EHS are located in the E-Building and in the D-Building.



This grant also represents a continued commitment by **Edgemont School** Foundation to fund technology initiatives within the district. In 2010-2011, the Foundation provided funds totaling \$353,000 to transform the entire school district into a wireless campus. Michael Curtain, Director of Curriculum and Instruction Technology for the district, thanked the Foundation for its support. "We are thrilled to receive this generous grant from **Edgemont** School Foundation. It will help us to continue to integrate cuttingedge technology with the curriculum in the classroom. The iPad is an excellent solution for schools for a number of reasons, including ease of use, portability, reliability and the ability to deploy apps quickly and inexpensively. The iPads will be a

great addition to Edgemont teachers' toolkits for creating and supporting rich, dynamic, and engaging learning experiences for their students. We appreciate the Foundation's ongoing support for technology and learning in Edgemont schools."





EDGEMONT HIGH SCHOOL GYMNASIUM NAMED FOR JIM SAN MARCO '63

he other day I called the athletic hotline at Edgemont High School to check on the location of the varsity lacrosse game for that day. How exciting that some of the sports events of the day were happening in what is now called the San Marco Gym! Just a few months ago, the "old" gym was named for Coach Jim San Marco, the legendary coach and former athlete.

San Marco was honored by the Edgemont School Foundation, which raised more than \$345,000 for Edgemont schools by holding the event in San Marco's honor. Funds raised from the Jim San Marco event will go toward renovating and modernizing the team room and the gymnasium at Edgemont High School, which, among other things, needs a new floor.


San Marco dedicated more than 44 years to the Edgemont Community. He was a 1963 graduate of Edgemont High School, where he was a standout athlete in football, basketball and baseball. He also captained several varsity teams and won numerous athletic titles and awards, including the 1963 Con Edison Scholar Athlete Award. After graduating from Ithaca College, San Marco returned to

Edgemont as a physical education teacher, eventually becoming the District's Athletic Director. Many alumni will remember what an impact he had on the students here San Marco coached many Edgemont varsity teams over the years, with particular longevity in soccer, tennis, baseball and basketball. With more than 500 career victories and a winning percentage over .800, his teams achieved remarkable success. Under San Marco's leadership, Edgemont soccer teams alone racked up a 211-67-24 record. The girls' tennis teams went 67-16-1 with three trips to the State Championships. Over 19 seasons, the boys' tennis teams finished 188-14, won league and/or section titles in each year, and had a stretch of 95 consecutive wins.

Over the years San Marco was known for his enthusiasm and the encouragement he gave to each person he touched. He became famous for his sayings known as

"San-Marco-isms." A few included:
"If you take your eyes off your goals, all you see are obstacles." "In every game, we win or we learn." "If you fail to prepare, you are preparing to fail." Hundreds of current and former athletes, school officials, family and friends crowded the gym for the event. A dedication plaque includes this inscription: "The victories and championships are there to count, but the true measure of the man is the scores of young lives he has permanently touched."

J. Allen Chao '79

Allen Chao was a longtime field officer of several United Nations missions in Asia and Africa. Chao was married to Kit Yu Amanda Li. He is the son of Samuel Chao and Dr. Adelaida F. Santos-Chao. He graduated from New York University.

Spencer Dvorkin

Spencer Dvorkin was a member of the Edgemont Board of Education for fifteen years. When he resided in Edgemont, he served on the Zoning Board in the Town of Greenburgh, was a volunteer firefighter in the Greenville Fire Department, and was president of local civic associations. He worked tirelessly to ensure quality education for all students at the same time that he fought to maintain costs for taxpayers. Mr. Dvorkin was married to Nancy Taddiken.

Alden A. "Beno" Larson

Alden A. Larson was Principal of Edgemont Junior/Senior High School from 1963-66 and Superintendent of Schools from 1966 to 1982. The Seely Place all-purpose room is named in his honor. Dr. Larson, who was affectionately known as "Beano" by friends and family, died on Dec. 22. He was 86. Dr. Larson received his B.A. from Harvard College, his M.A. from Clark University and his Ph.D. from Columbia University.

Art Mann

Art Mann received his undergraduate and graduate degrees from Rutgers University where he played football

and coached after serving in the Army Air Corps in WW II. He coached at Adelphi University and Caldwell High School, Caldwell, NJ. He retired in 1981 after a career of coaching, teaching and as Director of Athletics at Edgemont High School. Art passed away on December 10, 2012.

Gerald Pisano, Jr. '81

Gerald is the loving husband of Nicole (née Picciano) and the proud father of Julia. He is the dear son of Joanne and the late Gerald. He died on April 3, 2013.

Allan Pepper

Allan Pepper served on the Edgemont Board of Education for many years. At age 69, lost a long battle with cancer in February 2013. He is survived by his sister Judi, his brother Bill, his children Leslie, Joshua, Adam, and Robert, and his grandchildren Madeline, Jack, Ethan, Shannon, and Chloe.

Dru Frackman Pyne '72

Dru Frackman Pyne was the daughter of Noel Stern Frackman, '46, and Richard B. 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EDGEMONT SPORTS BRIEF

↑his fall was an incredible sports season by any measure. If you use wins and losses to determine success, Edgemont teams' records were 45-42. Roughly 51% of team contests ended with an Edgemont victory. Five of eight Varsity teams qualified for the first round of Sectional play and four members of the athletic community qualified and competed at the state level; tennis doubles pairs placed 2nd in the State and 2 swimmers competed in Ithaca. Thirteen student-athletes received All-League Honorable Mention, 33 student-athletes received All-League recognition, 4 student-athletes were selected to receive All-Section Honorable Mention, 4 studentathletes were selected as All-Section and 2 student-athletes were further recognized as All-State.

In the winter season, Edgemont student-athletes displayed their athletic skill on the courts, mats, and apparatus as well as in the lanes. Respectably, they accumulated several honors. The winter athletes at Edgemont received 20 All-League selections, 19 All-League Honorable Mention recipients, 1 All-Conference honoree, 8 All-Section selections, and 1 All-State Selection. In addition, we earned two league team championships and an individual State championship in Wrestling.

Spring results were not compiled at the time of publishing. Edgemont is proud of their athletes' successes including the way in which they play the game with their hearts and their heads. Most of all, we are proud of the extraordinary resiliency and leadership that was displayed throughout the season.

special events. The "snap gods" assign each student a target (another student), and the object of the game is to "snap" your target without being seen. If you are seen snapping someone or are snapped yourself, you are eliminated from the game. The last two students to survive receive free tickets to the senior prom.

Current Edgemont resident and Board of Education member *David Chao*, who graduated from EHS in 1980, highlighted the annual end-of-year Awards Assembly that has been a mainstay at Edgemont High School at least since the 1970's. "It is important to recognize and celebrate Academic excellence and extracurricular

achievement," said **David**. He also noted the School Spirit Award is now known as the Larson Award after former School Superintendent *Alden Larson*, who passed away in December 2012.

Finally, there appears to be another strong and growing Edgemont tradition that this article demonstrates—many Edgemont graduates return to the community as parents so that their own children can enjoy the same benefits and experiences that only an Edgemont education can provide. That is certainly a tradition worth continuing!
